According to Olivás family sources, Don Fidencio had just returned from the military when Delfina's wedding to Don Miguel Montoya occurred. Being family and being single, Don Fidencio went to the wedding. While at the wedding feast, the bride, Doña Delfina, insisted on having her picture taken with her dashing, newly returned veteran cousin, Don Fidencio.

This photograph, which documents this seemingly casual incident, could well imply how favorably the returning veterans were looked upon by other members of the community. It suggests that these veterans may very well have enjoyed a great deal of prestige and status for having served in the United States Army, short as their service must have been. Recall that the United States did not enter World War I until 1917 and the war ended in November of 1918. This limited involvement made service for Cuba's volunteer soldiers somewhat short but daring enough to give these men status among friends and family far beyond what they might have had before. Furthermore, having served in the war, these men now likely had more money than they could ever have earned herding sheep or staying at home.

We know from Herrera family members that Don José Leon Herrera came home from the war with a motorcycle. In those days following the end of the war, a motorcycle would have been quite a novelty in La Jara. Having such a vehicle would have been quite unlikely except that Don José Leon had served in the army where motorcycles were in common use. Imagine also the status that the motorcycle must have given this young man!

Turning now to a later war, on January 30, 1943, there appeared in the Albuquerque Journal two small pictures of soldiers in uniform, along with a short article about these men. Unfortunately, the quality of the newspaper photographs is not good enough to reproduce for this article. The soldiers pictured along with this article were from right here in Cuba. They were Sergeant J. Aparcio Gurulé and his brother, Corporal Merejildo Gurulé. The

article stated that both brothers were stationed with the Allied Expeditionary Forces in North Africa. The article also reported that Aparcio Gurulé had been with the forces that landed at Casablanca, Morocco, early in the African campaign and that his brother was serving in a tank destroyer battalion that arrived somewhat later. At the time, neither the family here nor Aparcio had any idea where Merejildo might have been. This was a reality that was not at all uncommon during that war.

As far as the war was concerned, 1943 was a deadly time for all Allied Forces everywhere. Europe was still under the tight grip of a strong Nazi German army which, at that time, appeared to be winning the war. Yet, amid all the chaos, death and destruction that was going on, our very own Gurulé brothers happened to be in the same place at the same time, somewhere in North Africa. According to the Journal article, the two brothers met there and were able to visit with each other, but only for about five minutes. Following that fleeting visit, they each went their separate ways to attend to the crucial business of war.

Today's readers must simply try to imagine the excitement and the jubilation of the local people as word began to get out into the street that the Albuquerque Journal had pictures of these two well-known and beloved members of our community. Furthermore, the news that they were both alive and had miraculously gotten to see each other in the battlefields of North Africa was astounding.

These two little pictures and the story that accompanied them were, for Cuba's citizens during World War II, not only a topic of joyous conversation and great pride but a historical event. Despite the fact that not many people bought the newspaper in those days, those who did shared their papers or read the story of this miraculous meeting to their neighbors and family members. History had been made for the people of Cuba in some far-away place called North Africa.

The photographs shown and described in this two-part series of "Antes" are not unusual or remarkable in any way, except to us. When looked at and studied from a historical perspective, they serve our "Antes" well by preserving a glimpse into our past. They are a momentary look at those who came before us and reveal who we are as a community.

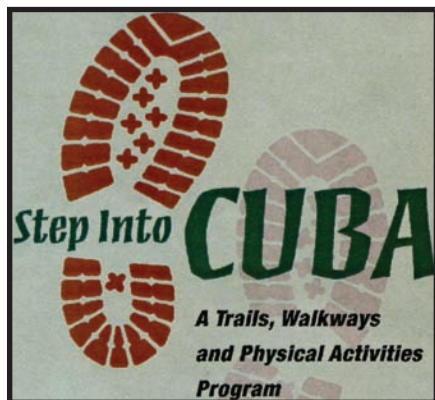

Step Into Cuba Receives Community Forestry Grant

Step Into Cuba was just notified of award of a Re-leafing grant of \$6000 from the New Mexico State Forestry Division Urban and Community Forestry program. Urban and Community Forestry— in addition to its Re-Leafing grants - offers a variety of services for communities throughout the state including technical assistance for development of local community forestry programs, tree care, training for professionals, planning and outreach efforts, and participation in community events.

Our grant will be used for purchase and planting of deciduous trees for the walking trail at St. Francis of Assisi Park next spring. We look forward to a productive future partnership with the State Forestry Division.

New Step Into Cuba Kiosk, Park Wildflowers

On Saturday September 12, New Mexico Volunteers for the Outdoors and local volunteers installed a new kiosk next to the north entrance of the Cuba Post Office.

The three-panel kiosk will highlight the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail routes near Cuba, the Step Into Cuba program and its walking activities and other

community events. It was provided by the Continental Divide Trail Alliance.

Volunteers for the Outdoors is an organization of people who donate time for trail-related projects. The group in Cuba spent two night at the Sandoval County fairgrounds and Saturday night heard future plans of the Fairgrounds and Step Into Cuba program.

The group also planted native wildflowers at the kiosk site and St. Francis of Assisi Park.

Thanks, also, to the Village of Cuba for their equipment and workers: Pam

Ramirez, Curtis Lopez, Leonard Jake, Antonio Crespín, and Ralph Montoya. With the Village backhoe one day and the Village bobcat another day, the Village crew moved the sandstone boulders into place along the park's walking trail, and even took one especially

gorgeous boulder to the library. It looks great and complements the lovely new landscaping done by Ray Sisneros.
